Directions: Purchase the textbook, *Schaum's Outline of Spanish Grammar, 6^h edition*. Exercises are for completion only. Complete each exercise in **pencil** in the workbook. Then correct your work in **ink**. Failure to do so will result in an automatic penalty of 20 points.

- Some sections have no assigned exercises. **Read ALL explanations in every section.**
- **Take initiative** to look up words you and try to process the exercises for meaning, as well as grammatical agreement.
- There are many irregular cases and rules reviewed in the book. If you skip the explanation **you are "flying blind"** and most likely **you will miss the point** of the exercise. I repeat, **read the explanations before attempting the exercises.**
- Make notes and write down questions/concerns with a page number so we can address them in August.
- Break the exercises down. Don't try to do them all at once. Give your mind time to process so you don't get overwhelmed.



Watch

1. Watch a Spanish TV channel. Try *Univisión* or *Telemundo*. I recommend news programs such as *Primer Impacto*, or *Noticiero*. You will see and hear speakers from all of the Spanish-speaking countries. *Tu Desayuno Alegre*, is a morning talk show with music videos. There are soap operas, *Telenovelas*, if that interests you. Additionally, there are many different game shows. You will need frequent contact over the summer with Spanish language and cultures.
2. Watch videos and DVDs in Spanish. While watching your favorite DVD this summer, select to hear or watch your DVD in the Spanish language. Spanish audio WITH Spanish subtitles works great. Watch music or other videos on youtube.com. The free telenovela "Destinos" from PBS is great and very addicting (<http://learner.org/series/destinos/watch>).

3. Videos and DVDs are excellent resources, too, for listening to Spanish. While watching your favorite DVD this summer, select to hear or watch your DVD in the Spanish language. Spanish audio WITH Spanish subtitles works great. It is especially helpful to watch a movie you know well in English. Disney movies work great for this, and most have a Spanish audio/subtitle feature on the DVD. Watch the program and jot down some words or things you don't understand or want to learn then. You probably will not understand everything, but over time your understanding will increase. Another option is to record a show, then pick a 3-6 minute segment and keep rewinding it, working with it until you get most of what is going on. You might also like working with music videos, songs, or commercials when you do this at first.
4. Seek out opportunities to listen to "live" Spanish. There are community cultural events and local churches that have activities and services in Spanish and local service organizations that provide services to the Spanish-speaking community. You can help others while helping yourself. Speak Spanish with family, friends, and co-workers. You may be surprised at how many people in this area speak Spanish.
5. Listen to Spanish music. Create a Pandora or Spotify station around an artist you know like Enrique Iglesias, Juanes, or Shakira.
6. Try a podcast in Spanish. Most are free. Two great places to get started are notesinspanish.com and spanishpod101.com. They are available on iTunes and online.
